

Professor Harriet Bulkeley Dr Margaret Busby OBE





Harriet is a key voice in the increasingly topical debate that surrounds the dynamic relationship between politics and environmental issues. Her particular expertise lies in relation to climate change and urban sustainability. Harriet has consistently been recognised as a leading expert in her field, and has received numerous prestigious awards as a result of her commitment and excellence in her field of study.

She is Project Co-ordinator for the H2020 Smart Cities and Communities programme NATURVATION project (2016-2020) involving a team of 80 researchers from 14 institutions in six European countries. The project aims to understand the role that nature-based solutions can play in responding to urban sustainability challenges.

Harriet has undertaken commissioned research for the UK Government, European Commission, nongovernmental organisations, UN-Habitat, the World Bank and OECD.

Dr Margaret Busby OBE Hon FRSL is a publisher, writer, editor and broadcaster.

At the age of 23, Margaret was Britain's youngest and first black female book publisher when she co-founded the publishing house Allison and Busby in 1967.

She compiled and edited the anthology 'Daughters of Africa: an international anthology of words and writings by women of African descent from the Ancient Egyptian to the present', which was published in 1992. The anthology features over 200 pieces of writing across a range of genres. In 2019, Margaret edited the second anthology 'New Daughters of Africa: an international anthology of writing by women of African descent', which was released on International Women's

She holds the Benson Medal from the Royal Society of Literature, and was voted one of the '100 Great Black Britons' in 2020.

Margaret has judged many literary awards during her career, and in 2020, she was Chair of The Booker Prize.

Professor Charlotte Clarke Alix Collingwood-Swinburn



Professor Charlotte Clarke is Executive Dean (Social Sciences and Health) at Durham University.

Charlotte is responsible for the strategic development and financial performance of the Faculty of Social Sciences and Health. She also supports and enhances research and teaching performance within the faculty.

Prior to joining Durham University, Charlotte was Dean International for the College of Arts. Humanities and Social Sciences at the University of Edinburgh. She was Head of School of Health in Social Science between 2011 and 2018.

Charlotte graduated as a nurse and worked clinically prior to research- and education-focussed roles. Her PhD research focussed on the experiences of carers of people with dementia.

Charlotte's research has since focussed on health inequalities and stigma, particularly in relation to dementia. Her research has influenced international health and social care policy and practice.

Alix Collingwood-Swinburn is Curator of Western Art at Durham University.

Alix joined Durham University in 2016 and works with the University's collection of modern and contemporary art.

Prior to joining Durham, Alix was based at the Middlesborough Institute of Modern Art (MIMA). initially as a curatorial assistant and later as a senior curator.

In her current role, she focusses both on the conservation of the artworks, as well as ways to engage the community with the University's western art collection.

Alix recently launched the Art Prize Art School, which has included a number of sessions to support the development of art and artists within the student community.

Chief Constable Jo Farrell Dr Nina Griffiths



Chief Constable Jo Farrell is Chief Constable of Durham Constabulary.

Jo joined Cambridgeshire Constabulary as a constable at the age of 22, after completing a degree in business.

She joined Northumbria Police in 2002 as Chief Inspector, and was promoted to Assistant Chief Constable. During her time at Northumbria, she was responsible for response and neighbourhood policing.

Jo moved to Durham Constabulary as Deputy Chief Constable in 2016 and was subsequently appointed to the post of Chief Constable in June 2019.

Jo is the first woman to hold the post of Chief Constable in the constabulary's 180-year history.

In addition to her work in County Durham, Jo contributes to policing at a national level. She works on information management and criminal justice file quality on behalf of the National Police Chiefs Council.

Dr Nina Griffiths is Director of Operations in the Colleges and Student Experience Division at Durham University.

Initially trained as a scientist, Nina changed career to manage Corporate Development at Northumbria Police before moving to Tyne and Wear Fire and Rescue Service.

Within her role in the Fire and Rescue Service, she set the strategic agenda to lead and position the organisation to meet emerging challenges, and to improve its services.

Nina joined Durham University in May 2019 as Director of Operations for the Colleges and Wider Student Experience.

In her current role, Nina ensures that a coherent and consistent service for the University's residential operations across the Colleges, Experience Durham and Catering operates seamlessly and holistically in support of the wider student experience and student wellbeing.

Professor Harriet Hawkins is Professor of Geography in the Department of Geography at Royal Holloway, University of London.

Harriet's research is focussed on the geohumanities, which is at the intersection of geography and the arts and humanities. She explores the geographies of art works and art worlds, with a recent focus on the underground as a site of new environmental imaginations.

She is Chair of the Royal Geographical Society's Social and Cultural Geography Research Group and is also founding Co-Director of the Royal Holloway Centre for the GeoHumanities.

In 2016, Harriet was awarded the Royal Geographical Society Gill Memorial Award, the Philip Leverhulme Prize, and an AHRC Early Career Leadership Fellowship.

Alongside her research, Harriet runs a PhD and ECR focussed Wellbeing Programme, which received a RHUL Teaching Prize in 2019.

Diana Martinez-Trejo is the current Graduate Common Room (GCR) President at Ustinov College and a PhD student in the School of Engineering, Durham University.

As GCR President, Diana leads the student community at Ustinov College, representing the views of postgraduates to the College and University.

Alongside members of her Executive Committee, Diana organises events and activities for resident and non-resident postgraduate students at Ustinov College.

Clare was born in London but grew up in the United States. She holds a degree in European History from Harvard University.

Following her degree, Clare has worked as a newspaper reporter and later as a magazine editor, with thirty years of experience in the industry. She has also reviewed books for the *Wall Street Journal* and the *Baltimore Sun*.

Driven by her passion for history, which she has also taught at high school level, Clare is now a historical fiction writer.

She recently published her first novel 'A most English princess: a novel of Queen Victoria's daughter'.

Dr Ruvandhi Nathavitharana is an infectious diseases physician and tuberculosis (TB) researcher at Beth Israel Deaconess Medical Center, and Assistant Professor of Medicine at Harvard Medical School.

Ruvandhi graduated from Imperial College Medical School and subsequently attended Harvard School of Public Health. She completed her medical residency in New York.

Ruvandhi's research is focussed on the optimisation of strategies to diagnose TB in order to decrease transmission. Alongside her research, she is a practicing clinician.

Ruvandhi is Vice-Chair of TB Proof, an organisation which works towards raising awareness of TB and reducing stigma around conversations surrounding TB.

She is passionate about providing a voice for survivors of TB, especially those from at-risk communities.

Professor Wendy Powers is Principal of University College and Associate Vice-Provost (Education) at Durham University.

As Head of College, Wendy provides leadership to the College community and is responsible for student enrichment and wellbeing.

Sara Sant'Ambrogio is a Grammy Award winning cellist and member of The Eroica Trio.

Sara studied at the Curtis Institute of Music and The Juilliard School of Music, where she won the all-Juilliard Competition within her first month.

Sara has performed as a soloist with orchestras including Beijing, Boston, Prague, Osaka, and the Royal Philharmonic.

She has performed internationally as a soloist, with concerts on six continents.

During her career to date, Sara has won numerous awards and competed internationally. She won a Grammy Award for Best Contemporary Composition for Bernstein's 'Arias and Barcarolles'.

She is a member of Naumburg Award winning and Grammy nominated Eroica Trio, who have performed thousands of concerts across the world.

Mrs Sue Snowdon, Lord-Lieutenant is Her Majesty's Lord-Lieutenant of County Durham.

Mrs Snowdon, Lord-Lieutenant is the first woman to hold the Lieutenancy since it was created. As Lord-Lieutenant, her primary duty is to uphold the dignity of the Crown.

Within her role, the Lord-Lieutenant supports and encourages voluntary service and benevolent organisations. She also takes an interest in the business, industrial and social life of the area.

Mrs Snowdon, Lord-Lieutenant is a former teacher and magistrate. She served as a magistrate for 23 years in County Durham and Darlington, and launched the 'Magistrates into the Community' programme.

She has also devoted much of her life to fundraising for charities, including cancer research and hospices in the Lieutenancy area.

Professor Janet Stewart is Executive Dean (Arts and Humanities) at Durham University.

Janet is responsible for the strategic development and financial performance of the Faculty of Arts and Humanities. She also supports and enhances the development of research and teaching in the faculty.

Prior to her current role, Janet was the founding Director of the Centre for Visual Arts and Culture, and Head of School of Modern Languages and Cultures at Durham University.

Janet's research interests include visual culture, the energy humanities and Austrian and German cultural history.

Her current research focusses on the connections between modernity, visual culture and the study of energy, specifically petroleum.

Dr Pippa Whitehouse is Associate Professor of Geography at Durham University.

Pippa's research focusses on the response of the Earth system to changes in ice and ocean loading during glacial cycles.

Pippa uses numerical models that reflect ice dynamics, sea-level change and Earth deformation to generate predictions of change through time.

She is currently leading a 5 year NERC-funded project that makes use of data from the UK Antarctic GPS network to improve our understanding of Earth rheology.

Pippa is committed to the communication of science to non-expert audiences. She recently published a blog outlining her experiences of installing instruments on the Antarctic peninsula as part of her ongoing research.
